
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01. Okinawa and the University of the Ryukyus



Okinawa Prefecture


Okinawa Prefecture, the southernmost prefecture of Japan, comprises approximately 160 islands. The prefecture's main island, the island of Okinawa, has a population of about 1.4 million. Formerly known as the Ryukyu Kingdom, Okinawa has a history of intimate cultural exchange with China, Oceania, and countries in Southeast Asia, leading to the creation of a distinctive culture rich with unique arts, rituals and cuisine.

Today, Okinawa continues to take advantage of its historical and geographical position to encourage economic, cultural, and educational interaction in Asia and the Pacific region, fulfilling an important role in international exchange as the "southern gate to Japan."

As the only subtropical region in Japan, Okinawa is blessed with a warm climate throughout the year and experiences relatively low seasonal and day/night temperature variation. Okinawa is known both within and outside of Japan as a place with a brilliant range of flora and fauna, emerald-blue seas, white beaches and amazing coral reefs. It is home to many endemic plants and animals and is recognized as an international tourist destination, with increasing numbers of visitors each year.

University of the Ryukyus

The University of the Ryukyus was founded after the end of World War II in May 1950, when Okinawa was under American military administration. The University of the Ryukyus gained its present status as a national university when Okinawa was returned to Japan in May 1972.

Faculties and Graduate Schools

Currently, the University composes 7 faculties and 8 graduate schools and has more than 8,000 students. The University of the Ryukyus includes the University Library, the University Hospital, the Tropical Biosphere Research Center, the Global Education Center, the Lifelong Education and Research Center, the University Education Center, the Subtropical Fields Science Center, and a University-affiliated junior high school and elementary school.

Global Education Center

The Global Education Center provides courses for studying Japanese, as well as the history and culture of Japan and Okinawa. The Global Education Center also conducts career counseling for international students seeking employment opportunities in Japan. Most study abroad students belong to the Global Education Center. The University Library



The University of the Ryukyus has two libraries, a main one in the Senbaru Campus and an Annex Library in the Uehara Campus.

Both libraries have a joint depository of about one million books and host a wide range of electronic journals.

The lending period of library books is two weeks, up to a maximum of 10 books for undergraduate students and 15 books for graduate students.

Besides books and magazines, there are also computer rooms and group study areas in the libraries.



Students may also visit the Health Center for medical consultation before deciding if medical treatment at the hospital is necessary.


In addition to general health counseling, the University Health Center also conducts regular health examinations for international students.

02. Ryukyus International Student Exchange Program



Objective

The Ryukyus International Student Exchange (RISE) Program is an arrangement made between the University and our partner universities abroad that enables students to experience student life at our campus while conducting research and taking classes related to students' majors.

This program provides students with a deeper understanding of both Okinawan and Japanese culture and customs. It also gives students the opportunity to return to Japan in the future to pursue graduate studies or research.

Courses Offered

- (1) Japan-Okinawa Studies Course
- (2) Glocal Leadership Course
- (3) Japanese Language Teacher Training Course
- (4) Major Studies Course

Admission and Period of Stay

1. April Admission
 - (1) Apr. - Aug. (Spring semester only; approximately half a year)
 - (2) Apr. - Feb. (Spring & Fall semesters; approximately one year)
2. October Admission
 - (1) Oct.- Feb. (Fall semester only; approximately half a year)
 - (2) Oct. - Aug. (Fall & Spring semesters; approximately one year)

Admission Requirements

Requirements for all students applying for the RISE Program are as follows:

1. The student's institution must be affiliated with the University of the Ryukyus or be a partner of the UMAP or ISEP.
2. The student must either be enrolled as a full-time undergraduate student who has completed his/her first year of study at his/her home institution or be matriculated as a graduate student. Junior college students who apply must be in their final year of study.
3. The students must be proficient in Japanese at the level required by each given course.

NOTES

Students must be enrolled in their home universities and **should not be expected to graduate during the period of exchange.**

Enrollment Status

Once accepted, students will be given the status of "Special Auditor", while graduate school students in the Major Studies Course will have the status of "Special Research Student" at the University.

Tuition and Fees

Examination fees, admission fee and tuition will not be charged to students whose institutions are covered by a Student Exchange Agreement that stipulates a mutual exemption of tuition fees.

Academic Assessment

(1) Our academic grading system takes the form of five letter grades.

*Criteria for Grades...A: 90 and above, B: 80-89, C: 70-79, D: 60-69, F: 59 and below

(2) Official transcripts of completed courses and credits earned will be issued by the administrative authorities of the department to which the student belongs.

(3) Decisions on whether acquired credits may be counted towards students' graduation requirements shall rest with their respective home universities.

Glocal Festival

This event aims to deepen cultural exchange between international and Japanese students, as well as the local community through various activities such as games, international cuisine and stage performances. International students are invited to introduce their countries and cultures to guests at this festival.



03. Course Descriptions



There are four courses in the RISE Program. Students may choose to enroll in any course depending on their purpose of studying abroad.



Japan-Okinawa Studies Course

— — — *Department: Global Education Center*

Purpose: Learn language, history and culture of Japan and Okinawa

Main Subjects: Japanese language, Japanese and Okinawan history and culture

Language Requirement: Daily conversation level in Japanese or English is desirable



Glocal Leadership Course

— — — *Department: Global Education Center*

Purpose: Acquire the ability to solve problems of the international and local community.

Main Subjects: Glocal Engagement Seminar, Business Japanese

Language Requirement: Daily conversation level in English (CEFR A2)



Japanese Language Teacher Training Course

— — — *Department: Global Education Center*

Purpose: Learn how to teach Japanese as a foreign language

Main Subjects: Introduction to Japanese Language Japanese Teaching Methods

Language Requirement: JLPT N2 and above



Major Studies Course (Undergraduate/ Graduate)

— — — *Department: Faculties/ Graduate Schools*

Purpose: Conduct research in one's own field/specialization

Main Subjects: Major courses in each faculty

Language Requirement: JLPT N2 and above

Apart from the Japan-Okinawa Studies Course, there is a Japanese Language and Culture Study Course within the Major Studies Course for students who wish to engage in specialized learning and research in their respective fields.

03. Course Description—*Japan-Okinawa Studies Course*



The Japan-Okinawa Studies Course is for students who wish to learn the history and culture of Japan and Okinawa while developing their Japanese language skills at the same time.

Students can learn and develop cross-cultural communication skills by interacting with exchange students from all over the world. Japanese classes are available from beginner to advanced levels. There are general Japanese classes that develop four skills — reading, listening, speaking and writing. Students can learn Japanese at a pace that best suits their needs, even if they have never learnt the language before.

History and culture classes are offered in both Japanese and English, and with frequent opportunities for fieldwork. Students can also take classes attended primarily by Japanese students that are aligned to their majors and/or areas of interests.

(1) Mastering the Japanese language, as well as the history and culture of Japan and Okinawa, so as to allow students to acquire knowledge that can be leveraged in their research activities and future careers.

(2) Acquiring cross-cultural communication skills by studying in a diverse learning environment.

Focus

Okinawan Culture Class

This class will introduce you to a basic knowledge of Okinawan culture and its historical contexts. Research topics will be discussed as a class with concept maps prepared in advance.

Lectures, videos, field trips, in-class activities, dance and music will be provided in addition to discourse on class insights through group discussion, research and presentations. Some of the cultural experiences offered are as follows:

Kasuri weaving, sanshin, eisa, clay shisa making workshop, traditional Okinawan dance and theater.

Okinawan culture classes are given in Japanese, and there is also an Okinawan culture class offered in English ("Okinawan Culture in Intercultural Collaborative Learning"). Students can select the class that best fits their needs.


Course Model for Beginner Level

In addition to learning Japanese, students in the Glocal Leadership Course will participate in projects such as beach cleanups and the University's Glocal Festival, which is mutually organized with Japanese students and local high school students. The course also includes plans to offer an internship program during the summer break.

Focus

Glocal Engagement Seminar

In this course, international students, Japanese students, and local citizens collaborate on regional development and share their findings and outcomes through the "Glocal Festival".

In the festival, participants create presentations and exhibitions of diverse cultural specialties that include regional languages, traditional practices, religions, social issues, food, music, performances, games etc. Discussions and presentations are managed "champ-lingually", mixing use of diverse languages including Japanese and English, remaining true to the spirit of "leaving no one behind". Seminar activities are aimed at nurturing budding glocal leadership.



03. Course Description—*Japanese Language Teacher Training Course*



This course is for students who wish to contribute actively to the global community as Japanese language teachers.

Students will be able to develop their language education skills by studying subjects related to their majors while understanding and practicing multilingualism and multiculturalism with Japanese students. Lectures are provided systematically and thematically, enabling students to learn about the language as well as pedagogical methods on teaching Japanese as a foreign language. Practicums are also available in the second semester.

Students can also take other academic major-related subjects and language classes if they meet requirements for completion.

Course Model

Students in this course learn the necessary knowledge and methods to teach Japanese as a foreign language through practical learning. Students can take Japanese language courses to improve their skills as well as select electives that they are interested in.



The Japanese Language Teacher Training Course is a one-year program.

The certificate of completion cannot be issued to students whose exchange period is 6 months.

One-semester study abroad students who wish to enroll in this course should consult with the Global Education Section (inbound@acs.u-ryukyu.ac.jp) before applying.




Focus

Classes on Japanese Teaching Methods and Japanese Teaching Practicums

Acquire the knowledge and the skills necessary to be a Japanese language teacher in a systematically.

After learning essential theories on Japanese language education (direct and indirect teaching methods), students take turns to assume roles as teachers and model in mock lessons in the class on Japanese Teaching Methods. In the "Language Training Practicum," each student chooses a language to teach and designs a course. They will conduct a readiness survey, needs assessment, and placement test before developing the course syllabus, planning lessons, and eventually teaching course contents.

Our alumni in the Japanese language education minor are actively undertaking roles as Japanese language teachers abroad and in Japan.

The Major Studies Course is provided to students who wish delve into deeper learning about their field of specialization.

Undergraduate exchange students attend lectures related to their majors, while graduate students conduct research and attend topic-centered study groups known widely in Japanese universities as “seminars”. By working together on research with Japanese students of the same field, students will be able to develop new ideas and flexible thinking.

As most undergraduate classes are taught in Japanese, students must possess at least JLPT N2 proficiency (or the equivalent). Students will choose classes based on consultation with their academic advisors upon enrollment.



Who will Benefit

Students who wish to study or conduct research in their fields of specialization.



Learning Goals

- (1) Acquiring knowledge on specialized fields of the University's faculties and graduate schools.
- (2) Developing research skills and flexibility of thinking through collaborative research with Japanese students of different backgrounds.



Language Requirements

JLPT N2 (equivalent or above) is required. Certain academic advisors may be able to provide academic guidance in a foreign language that students desire. *Requirements may vary depending on the faculties, graduate schools and programs. Kindly contact us for more information before application.

Learning Goals





JASSO's purpose is to provide support to international students in order to improve standards of education and research, as well as to promote mutual friendship and goodwill.

Applicant Qualifications and Conditions

To be eligible to apply for the JASSO scholarship, students must be in regular enrollment at their respective home universities. The following criteria must also be met.

- (1) The applicant must hold nationality of a country that has diplomatic relations with Japan.
- (2) The applicant must not be a citizen of Japan at the time of application.
- (3) The student's home university must have an exchange program agreement with the University of the Ryukyus.
- (4) The student is of good character and possesses outstanding academic performance at his/her home university. (According to JASSO requirements, the student's GPA must be 2.30 or above on a three point scale.)
- (5) The student has difficulty funding his/her studies in Japan for financial reasons.
- (6) The student will resume his/her studies or be conferred an academic degree at his/her home university after concluding his/her period of study in Japan.
- (7) The student must be able to attain "Student" visa status for his/her period of study in Japan.
- (8) If the student is due to receive financial aid and/or scholarships from other organizations while in Japan, the total amount of such financial aid must not exceed 80,000 yen per month.

As of 2021, only students in the "Glocal Leadership Course" and "Major Studies Course (including Japanese Language and Culture Studies Course)", and students who receive funding from the University's Inter-University Exchange Project (p.25) will be eligible to apply for the JASSO Scholarship.


Students who receive funding from the University's Inter-University Exchange Project are required to participate actively in online learning with overseas partner universities, as well as in events and activities organized by the Project.







06. Campus Life — Living Expenses/ Other Expenses

Living Expenses

The costs of living in Okinawa are relatively low compared to other cities in Japan. However, students require approximately 80,000 yen a month to cover personal expenses. Students are advised to make adequate preparations for living arrangements in the case that they do not qualify for a scholarship. Due to the demands of the program schedule, students are also advised not to take on part-time work. As students will not be able to open a bank account immediately after their arrival in Okinawa, it is necessary for them to have sufficient cash to pay for two to three months' worth of living expenses, or have a credit card that can be used overseas.



National Health Insurance

The National Health Insurance program provides financial assistance in the case of illness or injury. The annual insurance premium is approximately 14,500 yen and must be paid in full. Up to 70% of medical fees will be covered by the insurance program when insurance cards are presented at the time of treatment. The remaining 30% of medical costs will be borne by the student. All exchange students are required to join the National Health Insurance program immediately after arriving in Japan.

Accident Insurance

The University recommends all exchange students to enroll in accident insurance to protect and prepare themselves against accidents. Accident insurance consists of two components: (1) Personal Accident Insurance for Students Pursuing Education and Research (PAS) (valid for unexpected accidents that occur when students are engaged in regular curricular activities, school events, extracurricular activities and when students are on school premises or commuting to and from such activities) and, (2) Liability Insurance Coupled With PAS (students enrolled in this insurance scheme are entitled to seek damages for accidents caused to third persons such as bodily injuries and destruction of personal property when students engaged in regular curricular activities, school events, extracurricular activities and when students are on school premises or commuting to and from such activities). The total annual insurance premium is approximately 1,340 yen.


