



Regulations for the Organization and Conduct of the International Conference for Young Researchers “BRICS Youth Comparative Law Issues”

1. General Provisions

1.1 These Regulations define the status and objectives of the International Conference for Young Researchers “BRICS Youth Comparative Law Issues” (hereinafter referred to as the “Conference”), as well as the procedures for its organization, conduct, and conclusion.

1.2 The Conference is organized by the Faculty of Law of the National Research University Higher School of Economics (HSE), the International Cooperation Centre (ICC), and the Scientific Activity Support Center (SASC).

1.3 The Conference is held online on the platform <https://mts-link.ru/>.

1.4 The objectives of the Conference are:

- to promote the development of legal science and practice;
- to facilitate the exchange of knowledge and experience among young researchers from BRICS countries and the group’s partner states.

2. Conference Rules of Procedure

2.1 The Conference covers the following thematic areas:

- private international law and dispute resolution;
- digital law and the legal regulation of technology;
- criminal law, criminal procedure, and forensic science;
- commercial law and investment;
- current issues on the agenda of BRICS countries and their partners from the perspective of legal regulation (environmental protection, the development of “smart cities,” the protection of family values, the labor market, social justice and protection, etc.).

2.2 The conference consists of three stages:

- submission of abstracts by participants;
- online presentations by participants (conference duration: **90 minutes**; each presenter is allotted **5 minutes** to deliver their presentation and **2 minutes** to answer questions from the audience);
- preparation and publication, following the conference, of a collective proceedings volume containing the full texts of the best papers presented at the conference.



2.3 After the deadline for participants to submit abstracts, as specified in the Information Letter, the organizing committee and jury members – selected from among the conference’s invited experts – will review and evaluate the submitted papers.

2.4 The review and evaluation of submissions are conducted anonymously. Upon receipt of the abstracts, the Organizing Committee assigns a code to each submission, which is used for its subsequent identification.

2.5 The Organizing Committee reviews the papers for compliance with the requirements of these Regulations (formatting, originality, etc.) and may draw the jury members’ attention to any violations committed by the participants.

2.6 The jury members evaluate the papers based on the criteria of relevance and content, after which they decide whether each paper will be accepted for the Conference.

2.7 Participants whose submissions have been approved for inclusion in the Conference are invited to present and defend their work online.

2.8 Based on the results of the online presentations, the jury members will select the winners from among the presenters. Winners are required to expand their abstracts into full-length articles for subsequent publication in the Conference proceedings. Requirements for formatting the articles will be sent to the winners individually.

2.9 Conference participants whose submissions have been selected will receive electronic certificates, and the winners will receive commemorative diplomas.

3. Formatting of Abstracts

3.1 Abstracts submitted by Conference participants must follow the following structure:

- abstract;
- text of the abstract;
- reference list;
- authorship

Content requirements:

- Abstracts must be relevant and reflect the author’s original ideas;
- Papers written individually or in collaboration are accepted;
- 3,000-5,000 characters, including spaces and page references formatted in accordance with GOST R 7.0.5-2008; .docx format; Times New Roman font, size 12; 1,5-line spacing; 1.25 cm indentation at the beginning of each paragraph; 2 cm margins;
- File name: “Presentation Topic. Last Name First Name”
